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Project Purpose

The purpose of the School of Religion Project for the 2022-2023 school year was to increase communication on behalf of Catholic schools, build positive relationships with Pastors and Directors of Religious Education, and gather meaningful data related to program enrollment.

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Overview of Findings

From January 2023 through May 2023, the Office of Catholic Schools' Consultant for Marketing and Enrollment Management gathered data pertaining to School of Religion (SOR) programs across the Archdiocese. Communication attempts were made with 99 parishes, their pastors, and (if applicable) the Director of Religious Education. Conversation amongst the Division of Child and Family Formation personnel, which includes the Office of Catholic Schools and Children's Catechesis, also took place.

Enrollment

Using SOR program information shared by parishes, as well as data from the Office for Care and Protection (per VIRTUS lesson records), there are an estimated 8,878 children, Kindergarten through 12th grade, that are registered in SOR programs and *not* enrolled in Catholic school. *See Appendix for enrollment breakdown.*




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Feedback from DREs

Seventeen DREs completed an anonymous survey sent out by the Office of Catholic Schools. Of the respondents: 7 were from parishes in Johnson County, 3 from Wyandotte County, 2 from Leavenworth County, 2 from Miami County, 1 from Atchison County, 1 from Anderson County, and 1 from Franklin County.

When asked about the feelings, perceptions, and misconceptions of families regarding Catholic education, 64.7% of DREs said they had heard families say they cannot afford Catholic education. Another 58.8% also had heard families say the Catholic schools could not meet their child's special needs. 29.4% of DREs had heard SOR families express that the Catholic schools were not inviting of SOR families. According to DRES, affordability and student services, along with not being invited or information about the school, were the reasons SOR families do not send their child to Catholic school.

Need	Opportunity
 Continued dialogue at the Archdiocesan level regarding pastor and school relations. Provide SOR families with information regarding scholarships and the affordability of Catholic education. Create welcoming environments in schools to support SOR programs and relations. Shared information between parishes and schools, on both ends, to further extend the reach and impact of evangelization and faith formation. 	 Create stronger communities through collaboration between parishes and schools. Support shared ministries through invitation, collaboration, and sharing of resources between schools and SOR programs. Increase enrollment across the ArchKCK, specifically parish families that previously did not think Catholic school was an option for their family. Increase Catholic school family participation in faith formation and youth programs in the parish. Invite parish communities, especially those with no school affiliation and with smaller numbers, to be a part of Catholic school special events.



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Office of Catholic Schools Action Items

- The Office of Catholic Schools will continue to engage parishes and pastors to discuss opportunities for sharing of information between schools and School of Religion programs. *In progress as of 5/15/23*
- The Office of Catholic Schools will reach out to DREs annually for program enrollment updates to share with schools.
- The Office of Catholic Schools will reach out to the Office for Care and Protection annually for program enrollment updates to share with schools.
- The Office of Catholic Schools will create flyers for parishes without an affiliated school, to include information about those schools within a 30 minute radius. *In progress as of* 5/15/23
- The Office of Catholic Schools will provide schools with specific ways they can show hospitality to DREs and SOR families when sharing spaces. *Complete. See Appendix*
- The Office of Catholic Schools will speak with SOR families directly to hear their perspective and gain further insight into families' present challenges and the reason for school selection.
- The Office of Catholic Schools, in cooperation with the Office of Hispanic Ministry, will send out an English/Spanish survey to parishes with Hispanic ministries for SOR family completion. *In progress as of 5/15/23*
- The Office of Catholic Schools will identify opportunities to share faith formation and religion curriculum with DREs. *In progress as of 5/15/23*
- The Office of Catholic Schools will publish an updated School of Religion Summary Report each year to share with school leaders and enrollment managers.

Building Relationships

Each week, select a box at random.

Use the prompt to help build a positive relationship between the school and parish religious education programs.

Students: Write a riddle or joke on a piece of paper and leave it on your desk. See if the SOR students can solve it!	Teachers: Ask for the names and birthday month of the SOR students in your room. Create a card for them.	School Leaders: Create an Ambassador Group or have Student Council greet SOR students at the door and help them find their classroom.	Teachers: Have a welcome binder that includes any needed passwords (e.g. Wifi), locations, directions to the bathroom, and so forth!	
Teachers: Next time your class leads Mass, include SOR students and families in the intentions.	Teachers: Setup a pen pal program between school and SOR students. Leave letters, notes, cards, or drawings on the desks.	Students: Think of something funny that happened today. Draw a comic to share with SOR!	School Leaders: Invite DREs to the school's next faith formation or professional development day.	
School Leaders: Have a reception in the evening or on the weekend so students can meet their SOR counterparts.	Teachers: Identify an area in the classroom where SOR is welcome to leave books, pens, and other materials.	Teacher: Make a welcome sign and have all of the students sign it. Encourage SOR students to sign it as well.	Students: Leave an inspirational quote or Bible verse on your desk to share.	
Teachers: Write a welcome message on the board. Invite students to sign their names.	School Leaders: Designate a bulletin board in the hallway for SOR. Encourage listing students' names and pictures.	Teachers: Ask the DRE to share a classroom floorplan. During the last 5 minutes of class, have students rearrange the furniture to meet SOR needs.	School Leaders: Have a special event coming up? Students: Write the first line of a prayer. Leave it for the SOR student to add to. Go back and forth. line by line, until you have a prayer that you can share.
