

Over the next 10 years, the total population in the ArchKCK is projected to increase, but at a much lower rate than previous years. For example, in the ten years between 2000 and 2010, there was a 12.85% population increase. However, a 5.91% increase is expected between 2022 and 2032.





What does it mean?

- Only 43% of Americans attended a church service in 2022.

How Schools Can Help

- Teachers being more accepting of someone using their rooms
- Access to curriculum resources What could we share? Are there grants?
- **Student attendance / enrollment** Are we inviting school families to participate in youth groups and parish events?
- Parent meeting attendance Can we host a social to encourage attendance?
- **Volunteer shortage** Do we have high school alum that could help? Teachers? Parents?
- **Scheduling** Do we touch base with the DRE when planning our calendar.
- Access to technology Do we have a SOR-specific login they can use?

Class Involvement

- **Students:** Write a riddle or joke on a piece of paper and leave it on your desk. See if the other students can solve it.
- Teachers: Set up a pen pal program between school and SOR students. Leave letters, notes, or drawings.
- Teachers: Create a "happy to share" container with extra supplies.
- **Students:** Write the first line of a prayer. Leave it for the other students. They will add a line. Go back and forth until you've created a prayer together.

Building Relationships

Teachers: Next time your class leads Mass, include SOR students and families in the intentions.	Teachers: Setup a pen pal program between school and SOR students. Leave letters, notes, cards, or drawings on the desks.	Students: Think of something funny that happened today. Draw a comic to share with SORI	School Leaders: Invite DREs to the school's next faith formation or professional development day.
School Leaders: Have a reception in the evening or on the weekend so students can meet their SOR counterparts.	Teachers: Identify an area in the classroom where SOR is welcome to leave books, pens, and other materials.	Teacher: Make a welcome sign and have all of the students sign it. Encourage SOR students to sign it as well.	Students: Leave an inspirational quote or Bible verse on your desk to share.
Teachers: Write a welcome message on the board. Invite students to sign their names.	School Leaders: Designate a bulletin board in the hallway for SOR. Encourage listing students' names and pictures.	Teachers: Ask the DRE to share a classroom floorplan. During the last 5 minutes of class, have students rearrange the furniture to meet SOR needs.	School Leaders: Have a special event coming up? Leave flyers on the classroom desks. specifically inviting SOR families to join!

- Where can improvements be made?
- Who needs to be involved in this conversation? BUY-IN IS ESSENTIAL.
- What could we do together?
- Schools may use this <u>Self-Assessment</u>



Learn more about your audience.

- Use Google Forms or Survey Monkey to send out a poll/survey to parishioners. What do they want? What do they value?
- Look at your social media to determine what people are looking at and interested in.
- Reach out to the Office of Stewardship and Development (parishes) or Felicia Holcomb (schools) to request your Mission Insights information.

Come up with a communication / engagement plan for expecting parents and parents with young children.

- Regular mailings birthdays, baptisms, baptismal birthdays, Christmas, Easter
- Special petition at Mass invite them to attend
- Call to offer a tour: preschool, playground, "cry room," bathrooms, etc. (conduct an audit first - are we family friendly?)
- Use Mailchimp or Flocknote for parenting newsletter



Action Item #3 Continued

- Host an event just for these families:
 - Mom and baby Bible study
 - Monthly Mass for families with infants/toddlers
 - Informational nights Catholic parenting, finding a doctor for your family, understanding developmental stages
- Purchase a gift rosary, prayer card, board book, t-shirt
- Create parent mentor programs



Look at your calendar. Determine if you are creating engaging *and* fun opportunities for each of your audiences.

Create special events and groups for the entire community.

- Themed Mass (e.g. Children's Mass)
- Picnic
- Bingo
- Parent date night
- Church tour
- Catholic teachings special topic (City on a Hill)
- Movie screenings
- "Modesty Fashion Show"
- Book swap, free library
- Garden group
- Morning walkers
- Support groups parenting, single parents, grandparents raising kids, parents with teenagers, parents new to the area

Use social media to show how amazing your community is.

- NEVER make a post without including a picture or video.
- Post on social media at least 2 times per week.
- Tag, tag! Schools should constantly tag the parish in their post and vice versa. Like each others' content. Repost/share/retweet.
- Utilize <u>private groups</u> on Facebook for adults parishioner or parent page (let them ask questions and share information) SOR parents, soon-to-be parents, and so forth.

Tap into people's skills and interest by forming committees.

- Welcoming committee
- Social committee
- Mentor committee parents, couples, students, new to the area
- Beautification committee
- Social media committee

Parishes - list the school and specific programs on the interest inventory (substitute teaching, kitchen helper, librarian, beautification committee)

Schools - list parish suppers, altar society, grounds cleanup, committee member on an interest inventory asked of all new families
